

Observation of Teaching, Learning and Assessment POLICY AND PROCEDURE 2025-2026

SECTION 1: CONTEXT

1.1 The purpose of this Policy is to:

- Uphold Green Labyrinth's (GL) mission statement "Empowering Learning, Transforming Lives" for measuring the quality of education through observations of teaching staff.
- Provide clear guidelines on OTLA policy and procedures at Green Labyrinth.
- Outline GL's commitment to ensuring that observation of teaching, learning and assessment is developmental and supportive with outcomes for learners being central to the process.
- Ensuring that the overall performance and quality of the delivery are of a high standard across all training provision and delivery.
- Define GL's quality framework for observing delivery which ensures robust and reliable systems are in place. This is to firstly quality assure the delivery and secondly to drive quality improvement so that the learning experience of learners is positive, leads to high achievement and is highly rated by learners.

SECTION 2: STATUS

2.1 This policy was approved by the Senior Leadership Team on **17th October 2025**.

SECTION 3: DEFINITIONS

3.1 Observation is the process of watching a teacher's performance in the classroom and online to evaluate their teaching strategies and identify areas for improvement. The goal is to help teachers improve their skills and enhance learning outcomes.

3.2 Assessment is the techniques involved in collecting, analysing, and using information about learners to improve learning. These can be formative and summative.

SECTION 4: PURPOSE

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4.1 GL's system for observing teaching, learning and assessment will:

- ensure that learners are receiving a high standard of education, training and assessment which meets internal and external standards.
- monitor the impact and effectiveness of teaching and resources on learning
- identify opportunities for improving the quality of the learning experience to fully support and maximise learner achievement and enjoyment.
- ensure learners feel safe during the learning experience and that safeguarding and equality and diversity are promoted throughout the learner journey together with inclusive learning practice.
- develop solutions to teaching and learning issues and implement appropriate CPD.
- promote staff and curriculum development and dissemination of good practice.

SECTION 5: TYPES OF OBSERVATIONS

5.1 The following types of observation will be planned and carried out as part of GL's observation strategy:

- Formal
 - To be undertaken by a member of leadership for observed performance to be evaluated against GL's OTLA criteria in Appendix One and [Nov 2025 Ofsted framework](#)
- Informal
 - To be undertaken by managers as part of GL CPD developmental activities.
 - The focus of the developmental OTLA is based on recognising strengths and identifying areas for improvement in individual practice, in order to drive continuous improvement and inform future staff CPD.
- Peer
 - These may be undertaken by any Tutor/Trainer/Assessor/Manager to support the development of staff through the sharing of good practice, introduction of a new course or new learner activities. For example, team building activities, team problem solving, or when a new programme is introduced.
- Recorded
 - These are for bespoke programmes only, including home-schooled and online learners. Due to the individual needs of these learners, it will be the teacher's choice as to whether the observer joins live or the session is recorded. For recorded lessons, observations are to be observed within a week of the lesson date.

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SECTION 6: PROCEDURE

6.1 Leaders aim to carry out 2 formal observations for all teaching staff in an academic year in November and March. Staff will be informed on the dates and times of these. These may be more frequent in cases of trainee teachers, requirements of teaching qualifications and cases of cause for concern.

6.2 Teaching Assistants will also be observed as part of this process.

6.3 Informal observations will be carried out at least twice a year with no warning to delivery staff.

6.4 Should dates change for any reason, a minimum of 2 days' notice will be given by the observer to the member of staff being observed.

6.5 Where appropriate 'no notice' observations may be carried out.

6.6 The Observation Form in Appendix One will be completed.

6.7 During the observation, the observer

- Must minimise disruption and remain unobtrusive
- Observe for up to 45 minutes or drop into different stages of the lesson such as the beginning, middle and lesson end
- Note attendance and punctuality
- Evaluate the achievement of learning outcomes
- Record the promotion of equality and diversity, inclusiveness and embedding of Functional Skills (English, Maths and ICT) where relevant
- Note any cross-curricular content and learning value to other areas of life
- Aim to interview the learner or group of learners as part of the observation process, in order to triangulate evidence and to check if the lesson is typical of the learners' normal experience.

SECTION 7: MEASUREMENT OF OTLA

7.1 GL teaching observations **will not be graded**. Formative feedback will be given which highlights good practice and areas for improvement. See Appendix Two for a list of these criteria.

7.2 Professional standards for teaching and learning are set by the Education Training Foundation and Ofqual, with additional assessment standards set by the various awarding organisations which accredit qualifications. The November 2025 Ofsted framework sets the standards for the quality of delivery to learners, plus a grading structure which can be used to support judgements.

7.3 Judgements of the Quality of Teaching, Learning and Assessment are required to be comprehensive, detailed and standardised, based on the evaluation of a variety of criteria, primarily observations of teaching and learning and assessments and learner feedback.

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7.4 Staff whose performance is judged as Cause for Concern will be provided with a formal action plan, agreed within 10 days of the observation. It should be directed to address key areas for improvement through SMART targets. This action plan will be measured through 3-weekly observations for a term (12 weeks) to support the member of staff to develop their practice. These may be joint observations by leaders who are available to do so.

SECTION 8: FEEDBACK

8.1 Feedback will be provided in the following order:

- Verbal feedback within 1-3 days of observation.
- Written feedback provided within 3-5 working days of the observation.
- The member of staff should be encouraged to evaluate their own performance by identifying what went well and less well, prior to the formal feedback session. Self-reflection is critical to the observation process. An evaluation form is provided on [GL Lesson Plan](#).
- Face to face discussion of observation will take place within 10-14 days of the observation.

8.2 Observer providing formal feedback.

- Member of staff will share their reflections first.
- Observer feedback will be evidence-based and clearly demonstrate how judgments were reached.
- The observer must provide sufficient opportunity for the member of staff to ask questions and seek clarification of any points that are unclear.

8.3 Good practice identified through the observation process will be shared across GL through the following methods:

- Team and staff meetings
- Peer Observations
- Sharing of resources
- Standardisation
- CPD and Development Days

It will inform future CPD sessions and form part of the QIP.

SECTION 9: OTLA IN QUALITY CYCLE

9.1 Formal observations will take place in November and March.

9.2 Immediately following the observation, the Observers will provide a copy of their completed observation record and grading for discussion. They will agree the judgements or provide sufficient evidence to moderate the judgements and grade.

9.3 Trends of best practice will be identified and shared with team in team meetings.

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9.4 Common areas for improvement across the delivery will be highlighted and reviewed against upcoming staff training. Amendments to this training may take place to target staff training needs. This may be internal or external training.

9.5 Any cause of concerns and action plans will be discussed and agreed.

9.6 If the parties agree that there is insufficient evidence to confidently moderate observations, the parties should agree and plan for additional joint observations to provide the evidence. This may include the support from GL SLT.

SECTION 10: MONITORING

10.1 This policy will be monitored by the Senior Leadership Team.

SECTION 11: REVIEW

11.1 The policy will be reviewed annually.

11.2 The next date of review will be August 2026.
